
## Ireland 2040

While re-densifying our cities we must pay careful attention to walkability, the elimination of the car which will then allow for roads, streets and car parks to become extremely valuable pedestrianised public space. This space in turn can be used for cultural gatherings, sculpture galleries and an infinite number of other public amenities. Ensuring our shop fronts and city infrastructure are humanely scaled is imperative along with the careful planning of mix used developments and refurbishments of existing buildings, this will ensure a sense of local community which is lacking in our towns that are exponentially declining. Dense urban areas can be directly correlated to economic success. In summary, densification will lead to a stronger future Ireland.
