Dear Sir/Madam,

I am writing to you on behalf of Cheeverstown Advocacy committee. In response to your campaign seeking submissions for the National Planning Framework process, we have put together a slide show of the ideas and opinions of people who use the services of Cheeverstown House, the people we represent.

Advocacy groups have been running in Cheeverstown House for a number of years. In 2009 we reviewed the structures in place which highlighted a need to move towards a model of representative advocacy which gave advocates a direct voice to the Board of Management within Cheeverstown. Currently, we have our middle group of advocacy representatives made up of people who use our services.

Our group meets once a month and our views are facilitated through an external advocacy facilitator and an Artist with a background in Occupational Therapy. This middle level committee is made up of representatives from each part of Cheeverstown adult services and two board members. Information is gathered by nominated representative from their areas or be supported by staff to do so. This information is

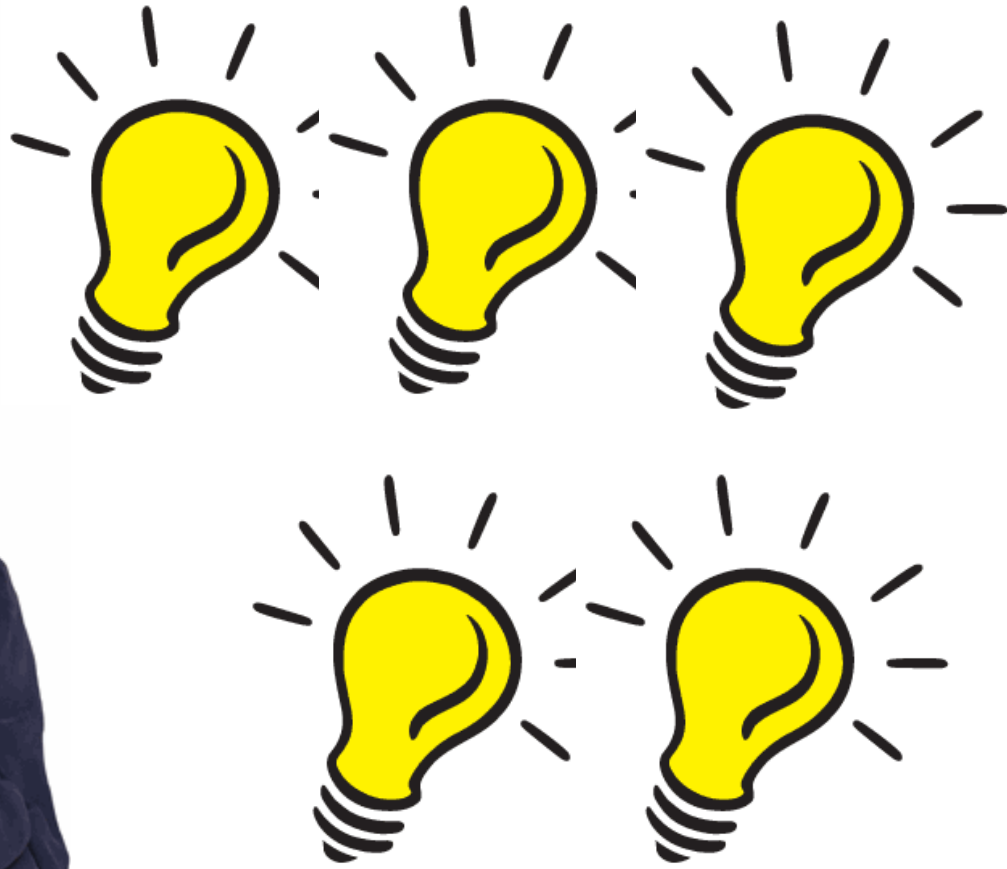
WHAT WILL IRELAND LOOK LIKE IN 2040?

- In 2006, just 35% of people with disabilities were at work compared to 73% of the general population.
- The ESRI report that people with disabilities are 4 times less likely to enter the workforce.
- Disabled people experience high levels of consistent poverty (13% compared to 2% of those at work).

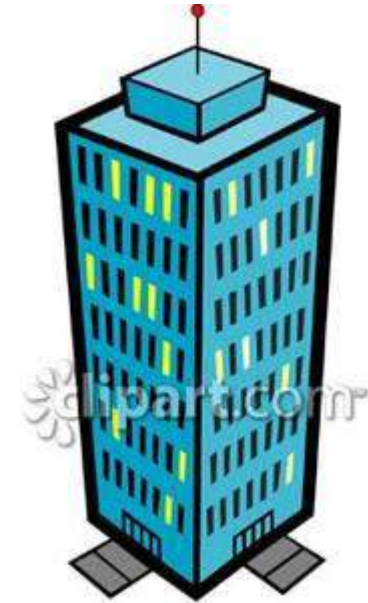

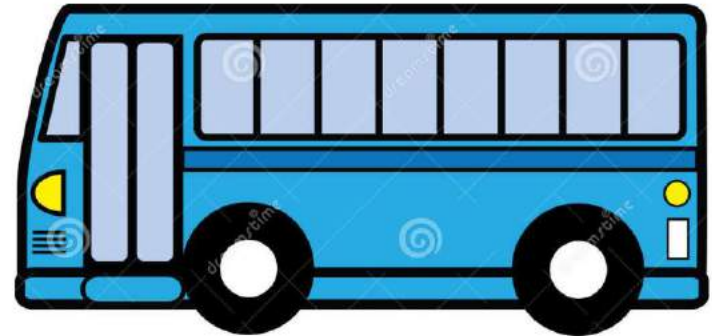

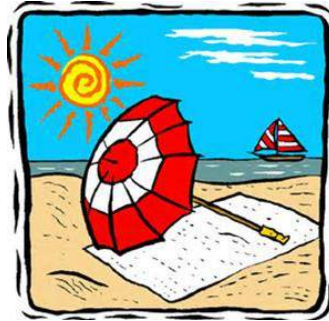

What will schools and colleges be like?



- Among people with disabilities, 43% have not progressed beyond primary education. This compares to 19% of all adults.
- Over one third of young adults (25 to 29 years) with a disability left school before completing second level compared to one in six of young adults with no disability.

Alternative Therapies

E.g. Massage, reiki, aromatherapy, Meditation, yoga, mindfulness, Pilates. Grants should be made available for people to set up their own accessible services so they can make their own contribution.



Availability of medical marijuana

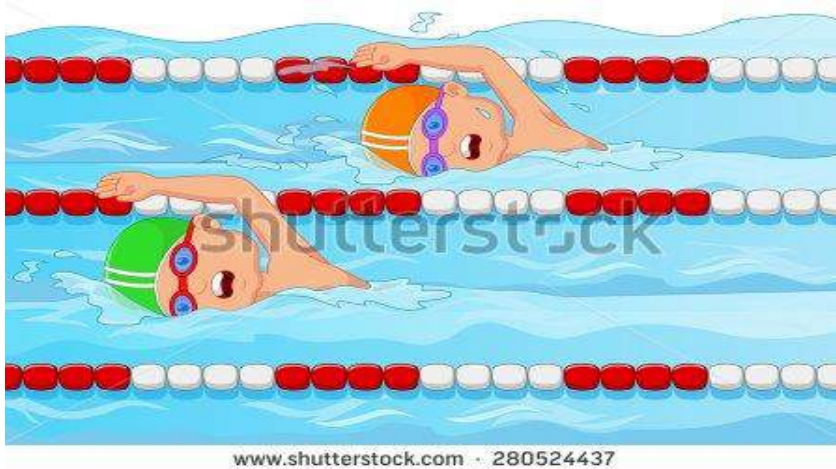

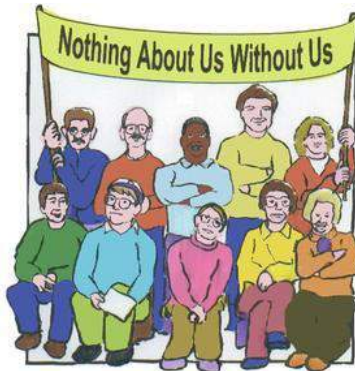
